Rostrevor House, the story continues

By Colm Daly The Rostrevor House nursing home in Rathgar was engulfed in national controversy last week after the Health Service Executive secured a court order to transfer management of the home to the HSE.

Information and Quality Authority said they had uncovered serious allegations of physical and verbal abuse. which had been reported to the gardaí.

The home is run by members of the well known Lipsett

Inspectors from the Health family who have denied any abuse by their carers of elderly people in Rostrevor house. HIQA has revealed five key allegations

against a particular care assistant known as 'P' in a court affidavit

In one instance, 'P' is alleged to have banged a residents head against a door jam and asked staff members to say the resident fell and hit his head. The case was reported to the owner of the home but no action appears to have been taken. It was also alleged that the same care assistant kicked a resident a number of times on the floor.

In another case it is alleged, the same care assistant routinely took a female resident to the bathroom on his own. According to the affidavit, when he did so, staff members said that they could hear the resident screaming in the toilet

The owners of Rostrevor house attempted to have the court order transferring mangement to the HSE overturned but Circuit Court President Judge Matthew Deery. He said he was satisfied that the HSE was the body now running the home and it had to make decisions concerning the welfare of residents.

Meanwhile, a director of the Rostrevor Nursing Home has said that she never received any complaints about the care that they were receiving. Sarah Lipsett said allegations were 'completely unfounded'.

Representatives of the Save St Luke's Campaign met Health Minister Dr James Reilly on June 9 to discuss the future of the Rathgar hospital, Ireland's one existing 'centre of excellence.'

The meeting was arranged by Dublin South East TD Lucinda Creighton, and was also attended by newly elected local Labour TD Kevin Humphreys who is a cancer survivor, and by senior officials from the National Cancer Control Strategy (NCCP).

After the new government came in, it was announced that Minister Reilly had put many of Mary Harney's closure plans on hold pending his review. But when Campaign Chairman Joe Guilfoyle asked him if St Luke's was one of the projects on hold he admitted he 'hadn't looked at it.'

Minister Reilly said, 'Nothing will happen to St Luke's on my watch. I don't see it closing but it's a big site. It's not going to close but it's not going to stay the

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centres which contradicted information obtained informally.

However, NCCP Manager Kilian McGrane agreed that medical staff had in fact been moved but stressed that any moves were 'voluntary.' He admitted that some nurses who had put their names down for transfer had subsequently withdrawn their names.

O'Dowd continued, 'Luke's hospital management asked us to deal directly with the NCCP when the HSE took over. Initially we got replies from the NCCP but a long letter sent in mid January, asking among other things about the retirement and non replacement of four linear accelerators has not been answered months later despite reminders. We are hoping that communications will improve after this meeting.²

Pressed on the lack of patient consultation in the decision to close St Luke's the Minister said he hoped to improve patient input into health policy and mentioned the Irish Patients Association and the Irish Cancer Society as organisations the Campaign might get involved with in the interests of patient input.

Joe Guilfoyle stressed that while the Campaign supports the new cancer centres because of increasing cancer cases, it feels that ex Minister Harney's description of the new cancer unit at James's as 'built with cancer patients in mind' was a sick joke.

He said, 'it's an ugly building crammed in between the underground car park and some old prefabs. There are no beds and no catering in the new unit which is an 'outpatients centre' only.'

Kilian McGrane responded by saying that the campaigners should see inside the building which has an atrium giving wonderful light. Pressed about the dilapidated prefabs which are only a few metres from the main entrance he said they might be removed at Phase 2 stage (which is several years away).

The Campaign book launched by presidential hopeful Senator David Norris, **Cancer in a Cold Climate: the shafting of St Luke's Hospital** is available in local shops including Rosalin's newsagents in Dunville Avenue, Ranelagh and Dubray Books, Swan Centre Rathmines. The book describes the background to the flawed decision to close St Luke's, how Mary Harney railroaded her bill to close it through the Dail and also contains moving patient stories.

The council have reportedly surveyed the area but have yet to announce whether or not they will be upgrading the cycle lane.

Never the less, the cycle and walk route looks like it is going to be a great success with local cyclists already availing of the facility. "I kind of see it as being a bit like the M50 but for cyclists" local cyclist Harry Wilkinson told Town and Village, "I use the city bikes for getting around the city and coupled with the new bike track it is really easy to get around. It runs down almost to the door of my apartment so I couldn't be happier with it."

The Grand Canal cycle route includes its own sets of cycling specific traffic lights, although these are yet to be turned on, and its own junctions as to make it safer and faster for cyclists to get around the city and indeed to help leisure cyclists to enjoy the views of the waterway. The cycleway also has very few road crossings which makes it a much quicker option for cycling around the city.

Safety for cyclists and pedestrians is something that also springs to mind when considering the new cycle and walking route and with plans to extend the route between Rathmines and Fairview on the north side of Dublin cycling conditions in the city look set to get much better.

Six years ago, a nineteen year old medical student collapsed and died on the first tee at Clontarf Golf Club. The student, Eamonn O'Coine, had just completed his first year exams at Trinity and was about to go to Calcutta for the summer to work in a school for orphaned girls.

Eamonn's close friend physiotherapist Shane Power (25) who lives in Portobello still remembers that dreadful day.

When he was eleven Eamonn contracted pneumonia and while he was in hospital it was discovered he had hypertrophic cardiomyopathy which is a condition leading to the heart muscle becoming thickened. He was monitored after that but we never expected him to die so suddenly and so young. We became friends at Belvedere College. He was an amazingly talented person, gifted academically - he achieved 600

points in his leaving certificate, he was good at languages and at sport yet he also cared passionately about social justice and was President of the school Vincent de Paul Society which worked in the inner city.

Shane together with medical intern Anna Finnegan and Declan O'Brien, who works in financial services for Morgan Stanley, also friends of Eamonn and living in Portobello, helped to organise the Heartbeat Ball on May 28 at the new Convention Centre to raise funds for CRY (Cardiac Risk in the Young), a charity set up in 2002 by parents and relatives who have experienced sudden and unexplained deaths.

The charity aims to raise awareness about sudden cardiac death, provide counselling and support for the families affected and to fundraise for the Centre for Cardiovascular Risk in younger persons (CRYP) at Tallaght Hospital.

The late Dr Garret Fitzgerald opened the Centre in November 2008. The Centre now has a clinic at St James' Hospital and hopes to develop a clinic at St Vincent's University Hospital. There are over 5000 deaths from sudden cardiac arrest every year in Ireland with 15% of these deaths relating to the under 35 age group. The subject has gained a certain profile in recent years with the deaths of sportsmen like Cormac McAnallen from this problem.

Shane points out that 'CRY receives no government support whatsoever so is entirely reliant on fundraising and on donations from individuals and other charitable organisations. People can donate online at www.cry.ie if they would like to help us.

The Heartbeat Ball was a great success and raised over €16,000 for CRY.

I remember the first time I met Garret. I was canvassing for the local elections outside Mortons in Ranelagh. It was my first time canvassing and I was wearing jeans and a shirt. Garret pulled up in his car and got out to do his weekly shop, I introduced myself. He stopped, looked me up and down, paused, and said I wasn't smart enough to be a candidate. He went in and did his shop and I deflated into the ground. Next week I was back outside Mortons, only this time suited and booted.

I saw him a couple of times after that, but when we next spoke, it was the first morning of the new Dáil. We bumped into each other on Dawson St coming out of the Ecumenical service. He congratulated me, and I reminded him of our first meeting. He said he didn't remember! We spoke about the campaign, about the constituency. I asked him if I could call around to have a chat and get some proper advice, and he said no problem. Only, I never did.

Garret FitzGerald was the first politician I was ever aware of. He was the TD in my constitu-

ency and my parents spoke of him often. I can't quite explain why, but from a very young age he always represented honesty, decency, and intelligence in Irish public life. Now I represent the constituency that he once did, and the people that he once did. And I seek to emulate those qualities in my service to the public. That is what his life means to me. But I know it means even greater things to so many more.

Garret FitzGerald died this month. We are the richer for his life.

Charlemont Street Regeneration gets go ahead from An Bord Pleanala

By Iain O'Connor. The Charlemont Street flats are to be the first redevelopment under the public-private partnership schemes which collapsed in Dublin in 2008. The new development will see the five acre site revamped to hold 253 new apartments, the majority of which will be for social housing.

The development has been given the go ahead by An Bord Pleanala but work cannot begin until the National Treasury Management Agency has approved the deal. Dublin City Council has said it is very pleased with the decision of An Bord Pleanala to allow the regeneration to go ahead.

Alcove Properties have been given permission to proceed with the development which will include the demolition of the 200 flats on the five acre site and the building of 253 new apartments. 139 of these will be social housing, with 16 being offered as affordable housing and the remainder being private apartments.

The original application had been for 260 apartments in five blocks with the tallest being eight stories in height but planning permission was only given for 253 apartments with the maximum height being six stories.

The regeneration of the site will also include office space, a multi-plex cinema, a sports centre, shops and restaurants which is unlike other previous publicprivate partnership developments but it is the inclusion of these other amenities which makes this development more viable with the sites proximity to other business districts.

The current flats, some of which date back to 1944, will be demolished in order to make way for the new development which will also include the previously demolished site of St.Ultans flats which were knocked in 2001.

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Prevention is better than cure

The importance of regular medical check-ups

Scheduling medical appointments when you're feeling fine may seem like a waste of time. But as the old saying goes; 'prevention is better than cure'.

Regular medical check-ups will pick up any potential problems, allowing you to take steps to either prevent them or begin early treatment. Many large employers insist that their executives have a full medical exam every year. If your company does not do this, do it vourself.

What should be included in a full medical examination? Your health care provider may refer you to a specialist physician for your examination. A

There are some specific tests for men and some for women.

Tests for men

Prostate examination These are tests to check for signs of prostate cancer. There are two common tests: the PSA made by prostate cells. The higher the PSA level, the more likely the chance of prostate cancer; digital rectal exam the health care provider inserts a gloved, lubricated finger into the man's rectum to feel for any irregular or abnormally firm area that might be cancer. While it is uncomfortable, the examination isn't painful and takes only a short time.

blood test - measures a protein

Testicular examination

These are tests to check for abnormal swellings which may be a sign of testicular cancer. Cancer of the testicles is rare and occurs mostly in men under the age of 40.

Test for women:

Breast cancer screening A test to detect possible tumors is done by mammography: a mammogram is an X-ray of the breasts which shows lumps and growths. Radiologists recommend a mammogram every two years from the age of 50 years. A lot will depend on your circumstances, for example whether you have a family history of breast cancer.

Pap smear

A test to detect early signs of cancer of the cervix involves taking a minute scraping of tissue from the surface of the cervix with a spatula. The sample of cells is then analyzed microscopically at a laboratory to detect any abnormal cells which may be pre-cancerous.

All in all, you may not have to undergo all of these tests, but it is good advice to see your doctor on a regular basis and keep them informed of any changes in your health.

Leinster Road Look and you'll see beauty

Leinster Terrace and the north and south sides which followed were known as Connaught and Ulster Terraces. In the 1860s, Thomas Grubb lived in No. 21 and later his son, Sir Howard Grubb, lived in No. 23. Lafcadio Hearne lived in No. 30, as did the architects John and Frederick Butler, at a later date. James Stephens lived at No. 2 in 1914. Charles Gavan Duffy lived for a short time in No.4 in the mid-1840s. Like Leinster Road the square had gates across the entrance and the two stone gateposts can still be seen to this day.

If you live or work in Dublin 6 at some time you will have walked or driven down Leinster Road.

We all agree the houses are very elegant and Indeed many of us as student's have lived in the basements, and attics .Some of us are lucky enough to even have bought one of these fine old houses and restored it. But to me what is most interesting about Leinster Road is the diversity in architecture between 1840 and 1920. Although we might think they are Georgain houses and they have a Georgian expression (facade), technically they are not, as the Georgian period officially ends in 1830. What we do see which is fascinating to me is the Regency period creeping in. With Dublin

being so close to London no doubt the well heeled owners of Leinster Road who visited London saw this fashionable regency style then in vogue and started coping it by applying the fashionable plaster stucco work to the front of there own houses. You can also see at the Rathmines entrance side a magnficent examle of a stable vard entrance with a regency expresson. (see picture above)

Across the road from the Stable yard entrance are three magnificent examples of Regency architecture. Note the decorative architectural plasterwork on the facade. Also typical of this period is the use of wrought iron work, presumably influneced by the Industrial Revolution where iron work became very

prominent. In this case it is used on the balconies of the houses pictured above. Further up the road we see a more Victorian influence creeping in circa 1890 - 1910 and this is very evident on mid Leinster Road. These can be easily identified by their more gothic expression and decorative coloured brickwork.It takes a trained eve to pick out many of these details and indeed there are many design fanatics who can tell you a lot more than I could ever do. But at the end of the day Leinster Road is an architectural delight and when you look up and around you all you see is beauty particulalry on a warm summers day.

Officially, Leinster Road was laid out around 1840 by Frederick Jackson through the lands of Mowld's Farm. Walter Meyler bought some acres of the farm as building ground, pulled down the old farmhouse and built 'two houses with stucco fronts' These are probably the two houses which stand behind the library. The road originally had gates across the entrance at the Rathmines end.

Rathmines Library, built in the Baroque style in 1913

Like other parts of the area, Leinster Road was home to several historic figures. Countess Markievicz and her husband. Casimir, lived at No. 49b. The Earl and Countess of Longford, Edward and Christine, lived in No.123 Grosvenor Park, now demolished and replaced by a new development of town houses. The Longfords were probably best-known for their involvement in the Gate Theatre

with their company Longford Productions. They were familiar figures in the foyer of the Gate in the 1950s with their collection boxes, trying to raise funds to keep the theatre open when the Corporation laid down stringent safety requirements. They succeeded but the refurbishment cost £30,000, much of it paid for out of their own pockets.

The gates and piers which guarded the entrance to Leinster Road were removed to form the entrance to Rathmines Waterworks at Bohemabreena.

Further along Rathmines Road is the lovely Leinster Square, which like other 'squares' in the city is not really a square, nor was it built as such. The terrace facing Rathmines, built in the

the red brickwork 1830s, was originally called

Was Madeleine abducted?

Four years after she disappeared in Portugal, Madeleine McCann has not been found. Kate McCann has written her account of her daughter's disappearance and the aftermath By **Enid O'Dowd**



You're meeting seven neighbours, with eight children under four between you, in one of Ranelagh's many restaurants, only 120 metres or so from your homes which you can't see from the restaurant; what do you do about childcare?

That was the 'almost' equivalent dilemma faced by Kate and Gerry McCann and their friends on their holiday in Praia da Luz in May 2007 - except they were not on their home patch as you were in Ranelagh. The group, which became known as the Tapas nine and six of whom were doctors, decided to make 30 minute checks. This system, Kate claims, had worked on previous evenings but when she checked at 10 pm on Thursday May 3rd, Madeleine was not there and, despite an international search involving the Portuguese and UK police and private detectives, she has still not been found

Last month Kate McCann pub-

lished "Madeleine - our daughter's disappearance and the continuing search for her". In the foreword of the book she states that her "reason for writing the book is to give an account of the truth". Isn't that odd phraseology - surely there can only be one version of the truth? All kinds of tales have circulated about Madeleine's disappearance according to Kate, and indeed they have; the publication of this "truthful" book seems to have accelerated the internet debates on the discrepancies in the McCanns' story.

The book is actually the story of Kate's life to date. It covers her childhood, her education, her meeting and marriage to Gerry McCann and the births of their three children. The McCanns needed a series of IVF treatments to become parents which makes it all the more odd that they would leave three children under four in an unlocked apartment on the ground floor in a foreign country.

According to Kate, all three children were good sleepers. She did not want to use the evening crèche provided by the holiday company; understandable as her children had a routine and were in bed by the time the crèche opened at 7.30 pm.

She argues on p. 54 that it would have been unwise to leave the children with someone neither they nor themselves knew. Yet her children were happy in the day childcare facilities and had come to know the staff who were available, at extra cost, to babysit for clients in the evening.

She states "we felt so secure we

simply didn't think it was necessary (to hire a babysitter) and our own apartment was only 30-45 seconds away".

An astonishing statement.

Surely security concerns are not the main reason parents organise babysitters? As a GP, she more than anyone, would appreciate that the risks of leaving children alone at night do not relate to "security" but to other factors, like vomiting and choking, waking up from a nightmare, wetting the bed, and febrile convulsions which affect one in twenty children under five.

Kate does not mention a witness statement by Pamela Fenn who lived in the apartment above stating that she heard a child crying for 75 minutes on Tuesday May 1st calling for "daddy". This contradicts Kate's statement of 30 minute checks.

The book cover proclaims that all royalties are donated to the Madeleine Fund. A company called Madeleine Fund: Leaving No Stone Unturned Ltd was incorporated on 15 May 2007. According to Kate, over the weekend of 11th. 12th and 13th May she and Gerry had meetings in Praia da Luz with a paralegal from the International Family Law Group and a barrister. The barrister told them "our behaviour (in leaving the children unattended) could not be deemed negligent" and was "well within the bounds of reasonable parenting".

The legal pair suggested the McCanns use London solicitors Bates Wells and Braithwaite to

set up a company to manage the funds that would be donated. On p.137 she records that this firm drew up articles of association for the fighting fund (limited company) and talked to the Charity Commission who ruled that the proposed company did not meet the requirements for charity status as it focussed on one child and did not meet the public benefit test. Hence Kate says, the decision was that "it would be a 'not for profit' private limited company. It was set up with great care and due diligence by experts in the field".

From the dates Kate gives, it would appear that Bates Wells and Braithwaite could not have had instructions to act until Monday May 14th, yet they were able to incorporate the company the very next day.

A day is very little time for the solicitors to have drafted company documents for this proposed company which was not an ordinary trading company, to have agreed the documents with their clients the McCanns who were in Portugal and also to have obtained a ruling from the Charity Commission

And what was the hurry given that Madeleine could have been found at this early stage of the investigation?

On p.138 Kate says "everyone agreed that despite the costs involved it (the company) must be run to the highest standards of transparency".

To date, three sets of accounts have been filed with the UK Company's office. In the first set going to March 2008 an analysis of expenditure is given though this is not a statutory requirement under UK law. However the accounts filed for the years to March 2009 and to March 2010 give no expenditure analysis. Now this is perfectly legal but not the "transparency" to which Kate referred. In 2009 for example the only expenditure information filed gives the merchandising and campaign costs as £974,786 and the administration expenses as £30,865. Not very informative!

When the McCanns were made arguidos (suspects) in September 2007 Kate refused on legal advice to answer the 48 questions put to her. This was her legal right but the refusal fuelled the doubts about her story. It is understandable why she might not want to answer questions in a foreign country with the possibility of mistranslations complicating her difficult situation but surely there is no reason now not to put the record straight by answering the questions in her book. She doesn't do so.

British sniffer dogs Eddie and Keela and their handler Martin Grime were used by the Portuguese authorities. These dogs had a 100% accuracy rate in 200 cases and found both blood and cadaver (dead body) traces in various places in the holiday apartment and in the boot of the car rented after the disappearance. Kate says that research Gerry conducted after the Portuguese police showed them the video of the dogs' search revealed that dog evidence is unreliable. She quotes Gerry as dismissing the sniffer dog video as "the most subjective piece of

evidence gathering imaginable". She claims that the dogs had merely been trying to please their instructor.

If you read this book without having read the other material available which questions the abduction theory, you could not fail to have the greatest of sympathy for the McCanns. However, it is a statistical fact that in the majority of missing children cases, a family member, a neighbour or someone known to the child, is involved. The Portuguese police would have been negligent if they did not consider this possibility. They did not find any forensic evidence of an intruder in the apartment which had been to some extent contaminated by the Tapas group searching the apartment when Kate raised the alarm.

Since the book was published last month, Scotland Yard has agreed to conduct a review. A reconstruction of that evening which the Tapas nine initially agreed to do but which never happened would help. Hopefully the review will be independent with the co-operation of all and with no possibilities excluded.

The book costs €15.99 in local shops and is published by Bantam Press.

We hear a lot about global warming, renewable energy and climate change nowadays. The need seems to be clear enough but, as yet, only around 12.9% of the energy supply required by the world comes from renewable sources.

The fastest growing technology is solar electric power, yet this continues to be among the most expensive option and will continue to be so for several more years. The good news is that a recent report on climate change says that renewable technologies could provide 80 per cent of the world's energy needs in the next thirty years or so. However, there is a solution closer to hand than we may think, and that solution is just a few hops across the water to one of our beautiful islands -El Hierro, once known as 'Fire Island'.

El Hierro gained its original name of 'Fire Island' from its origins of volcanic eruptions many years ago, and although volcanic activity has now gone, the natural Earth forces of water and wind remain. These power sources are now due to be harnessed so that by 2012, this small island in the Atlantic will be the first to be able to generate all of its electricity needs from sources that are renewable.

There is plenty of wind on El Hierro and also enough rain to meet the needs of the 10,700 inhabitants of the island, and the five wind turbines in the north east of the island will produce enough electric power to supply all of the island's energy needs, as well as pumping water from a reservoir near the harbour to a bigger reservoir at a higher level within a volcanic crater. What if there is no wind? Well, in that case, water is released from the higher reservoir through these pipes that will drive hydraulic turbines to create electric energy. Therefore, electricity can be produced by wind or water power. Clever stuff!

This project in El Hierro is the first that does not use electricity produced from traditional methods, and contributes to moving the island towards being totally self-sufficient.

This project alone means that the island will meet 100% of its energy needs by 2015, but El Hierro has launched other sustainability projects too. The island is mainly agricultural, and is a leader in organic farming, as well as in projects that convert sewage into fertiliser and methane.
